Residents of Herbert Street to John Vernon

To John Edward Vernon, Esq:

We the undersigned beg to call your attention to the great inconvenience caused to the inhabitants of Herbert Street and the vicinity of the practise {sic} recently introduced in the convent in Baggot Street of ringing or tolling a bell every morning at the early hour of 6 o'clock, followed by another shortly before 7 o'clock a.m. Whereby not only are members of our family aroused at an hour to them inconveniently early, but the value of property in the neighbourhood is likely to be seriously depreciated from the unwillingness of persons to become or remain tenants of houses where they would be liable to be disturbed.

We feel most unwilling to interfere with the arrangement of any institution more especially a religious one, but regard both to the comfort of our families and the value of our property compel us to request that you will as agent to the Right Honorable Sidney Herbert represent the matter to authorities of the convent, who we trust will see the reasonableness of the request.
