The #16Days16Stories videos illustrate that vulnerability to human trafficking entails a slow process of victimisation beginning in early childhood, rather than random acts of sexual exploitation. These women's stories, told in their own words, reveal the sinister and structural oppression of young women on which the sex trade thrives.

The narratives also reveal women's resilience and desire to be self-determining. This is expressed through their hopes and dreams for a better life.

These narratives are formative in shaping global policy to end human trafficking.


How to use the #16Days16Stories videos:

- 1. Take your time to watch the videos
- 2. Pause on any of the slides, but in particular, the reflection slides.
 TIP: you can pause the video by hitting the spacebar on your keyboard. Hit the spacebar again to resume.
- 3. Think about the life course of these women. The stories of these formerly trafficked women highlight cumulative disadvantage over their life course through the interplay between their personal story and the social, economic and political context in which they live.
