13.00	Keynote – Sabrinna Valisce
	Much commentary on prostitution today revolves around the recommendation that it would be a good idea to decriminalise the entire sex trade, including pimps, brothel keepers and sex buyers, in line with the approach taken by New Zealand. In this keynote we hear from Sabrinna Valisce, who was prostituted in New Zealand prior to and after decriminalisation, and actively championed and campaigned for the NZ decriminalisation model until she saw the carnage it wrought on the women of her country.
