Leader: We now hear and respond to the words of Pope Francis in Laudato Si.

Speaker 1: I will point to the intimate relationship between the poor and the fragility of the planet, the conviction that everything in the world is connected...

All: We will not forget that we are interconnected. That suffering anywhere on our Common Home causes pain to God, causes pain to us.



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Speaker 1: ... the call to seek other ways of understanding the economy and progress, the value proper to each creature, the human meaning of ecology, the need for forthright and honest debate, the serious responsibility of international and local policy, the throwaway culture and the proposal of a new lifestyle.

All: We will respond in new ways. We will value all of life and be responsible for our lifestyles.



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Speaker 1: If we acknowledge the value and the fragility of nature and, at the same time, our Godgiven abilities, we can finally leave behind the modern myth of unlimited material progress...

All: We will care for the wounded and we will turn from the myths of the past.
