The Psalms 112 to 117 and again 135, begin with the word "Allelujah", "Hallel" in Hebrew. They are songs of joy and thanksgiving that recount in detail the great deeds of God toward his chosen people at various points of their history. They were sung at various solemnities and especially at the paschal meal. I think they are most fitting biblical texts to set the tone of our celebration this afternoon:

Alleluia! O give thanks to the Lord for He is good, for His love endures for ever. Give thanks to the God of gods, for his love endures for ever. Give thanks to the Lord of Lords, for His love endures forever. To the God of heaven give thanks, for his love endures forever.

We, too are joyfully assembled to give thanks to God as we recount his blessing in the fiftieth anniversary of the establishment of the Religious Sisters of Mercy (RSM here in Mambajao, for we believe, as our fathers of old, that it is the Lord "who carried us on eagle wings and brought us here to himself" (Ex 19:4).

For sure the Religious Sisters of Mercy had a very good time here in the island. They enjoyed the precious moments talking with the people, the students, the parents, the teachers... the camaraderie with fellow religious and the clergy etc. The Sisters prayed and worked as it is the life of the religious...ora et labora, for the Church's mission. Kindling...the last word in the theme means... that the Sisters still have high spirits and have best wishes for Fatima College and the island. Wherever the Sisters are, they still do their very best in all their undertakings. The Sisters are always resplendent and grateful to the people in the island!

Ready or not, however, someday the stay of the Sisters in this island/world will all come to an end. There will be no more sunrises, no sunsets, any minutes, hours or days to count. All the teachings of the Sisters, whether treasured or forgotten, will be passed on to others. Hence it is a challenge and a call to the young people to listen to the promptings of the Holy Spirit within you to generously respond to God's call to the religious life.
