Purpose of the MIA Archive Committee

- To provide oversight for MIA archives and artifacts currently held at MIA, Baggot Street and Catherine McAuley Centre, Herbert St, Dublin.
- To assist MIA in its recognition and promotion of the archival treasures of its Members.



In carrying out its purpose, within the resources available, the committee's responsibilities included, but were not limited to the following activities:

- 1. To oversee the plan, timeline and budget for relocating artifacts and archives between MIC and the Archives of the Congregation of the Sisters of Mercy, Ireland, 2003.**



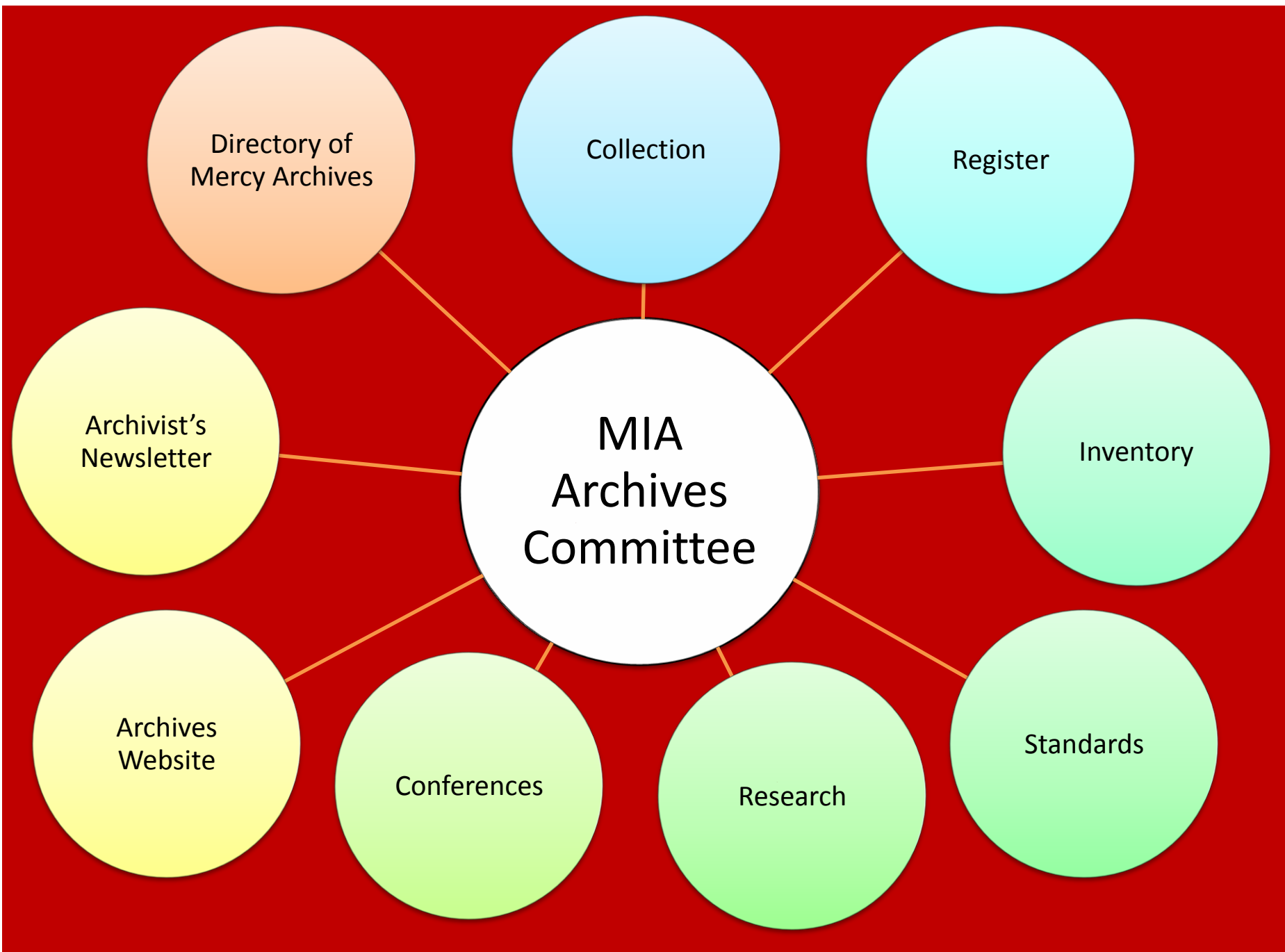
- 2. To promote worldwide Mercy networks to ensure that documentation of the Mercy story is protected, preserved and used in such a way that it is an inspiration for contemporary and future Mercy mission.**
- 3. To nurture and promote research on Mercy topics and on Mercy archival materials.**



- 4. To identify the character and location of the current archival holdings of the Members.**
- 5. To draw up protocols for research.**
- 6. To promote standard practice for the acquisition, preservation and use of archival holdings.**



- 7. To provide an annual report to Mercy International Association prior to their Annual General Meeting.**
- 8. Liaison Sister from Mercy International Association was appointed to the Archives Committee.**

Since the relocation of artifacts and archives between MIC and the Irish Congregational Archive, the work of identifying, labeling and filing the MIA Archives is carried on by Marianne Cosgrave.

Marianne has also prepared a Catalogue of the MIA Archives Collection as well as Access and Conservation Policies.

Primary Source Materials of the Sisters of Mercy

Phase One:

Autograph writings by Catherine McAuley, in her own handwriting on the original paper.

Phase Two:

Writings by Sisters who entered a Mercy Convent before or in 1850, in their own handwriting on the original paper.



A computerized inventory of Primary Source Materials, up to and including 1850, in Mercy Archives, worldwide, is still ongoing.
